

Almost Home - The Letters of Peter (I Peter 1:1-9)

We would have a tough time imagining the world in which Peter is writing his letters. He addresses this letter to Christians throughout modern-day Turkey, and in the years in which this was written the church was going through intense persecution from the Emperor Nero. And yet, notice how Peter begins this letter - "May grace and peace be multiplied to you." But how? He tells us in the next verses. Whereas at this moment they are "grieved by various trials" from the throne of Nero, Peter instead tells these believers to turn their attention to the throne of God the Father Who has given them a Living Hope in the person of Christ (v. 3, 6). This point to their hope as alive would be vitally important to the readers be-cause many of them in the years to come would be killed for their faith at the hands of Nero whom istory looks back on with more disdain than most modern-day tyrants. So why was Christ their Living Hope? Because He had already won the victory through His death and resurrection (v. 2-3). This was ne hope promised to them fór why they should endure for their faith - so as Christ had béen raised, so would they - and in their suffering they would be refined as gold to the praise, honor, and glory of God which would be made complete when Christ would return (v. 7). It is important for us to live in this hope as well - not in a sense of despair, but in anticipation of Christ's return to earth - and keep our eyes on the same outcome of faith - the salvation of our souls - that Christ will work in us as well as our brothers and sisters that Peter wrote to (v. 9).

Moore News....

The Bible reading plan is now covering a variety of books, but 1 Chronicles is one so I will provide a summary of Chronicles. The books of Chronicles were originally one book before being divided into two books due to the lengthiness of the text on a single scroll (The World and the Word, 331). Therefore, my summary below covers both 1 and 2 Chronicles.

Beginning in the first section there are nine chapters of genealogies beginning with Adam and ending with Saul (1 Chron 1-9). The genealogies highlight the universal hope of salvation in the Messiah.

The second section, which is, "Foundational portraits of kingdom hope," follows the genealogies as First Chronicles skips over Saul's reign and begins with David's anointing as king (1 Chron 11) (DeRouchie, VL). David is king over Israel, and he grew in his greatness for God was with him (1 Chron 11:9). David wished for God to be exalted in worship, so he devised a plan to bring the ark back to Jerusalem and to build a tabernacle (1 Chron 16:1, 4, 31). There is still no temple, so David set out to build a temple for God (1 Chron 17:1), but instead God established a covenant with David and builds a house for him (1 Chron 17:9-14). This house that God would build for David is a "dynastic succession that will endure forever" (The World and the Word, 340). Chapters eighteen through twenty focus on the great success that the LORD gave David for his faithfulness (1 Chron 18:6). There is no mentioning of Davids downfall in Chronicles. The author skips over his adultery with Bathsheba, Uriah's murder, and other wrongdoings in order to "magnify God's grace and glory despite human failings" (The World and the Word, 340). Since David would not be the one to build the temple for God, he gathered the needed provisions and he prayed for Solomon to be faithful to keep God's commandments and build the temple (1 Chron 29:19). Solomon was then anointed king in the place of David (1 Chron 29:22-23), and the first nine chapters of Second Chronicles highlights Solomon's devotion to the temple, knowing the temple is where true worship took place (DeRouchie, VL). Solomon died and his son, Rehoboam would reign in his place (2 Chron 9:31), and this is where the kingdom would divide.

The division of the kingdom starts the third section of Chronicles as the kingdom hope fades away beginning in second Chronicles chapter ten and comes alive again at the end of the book (2 Chron 10-36) (DeRouchie, VL). This section focuses on the kings of Judah, which enables the reader to remained focused on the Davidic line and the temple (DeRouchie, VL). The narratives of Hezekiah and Josiah are raised as they were consumed with matters concerning temple worship (The World and the Word, 331). It is not until chapter thirty-six where one reads about the destruction of Jerusalem and the temple (2 Chron 36:17-21). The author attributes a small portion to the passing away of kingdom hope before the proclamation of Cyrus was made to rebuild the temple in Jerusalem, enabling the kingdom hope to be reborn (2 Chron 36:22-23).

Chronicles highlights God's faithfulness and compassion towards His people as the reader is encouraged to look past Israel's punishment for their unfaithfulness and focus on Jesus, who would come from the line of David and from Judah to restore and reign over His people (DeRouchie, VL). Chronicles teaches the modern church to look back through history and see how God was faithful to His people and to His word, which should awaken the church to greater worship.
