



<u>A Note on Our New Church Budget Starting September</u> 1 – Embracing Prudent Stewardship

Dear Church Family/Leadership Team,

As we approach the start of our new fiscal year on September 1, I'm excited about the opportunities ahead for ministry, outreach, and growth in our church community. Our approved budget reflects prayerful planning and a commitment to using God's resources wisely to advance His

That said, I want to share a gentle reminder about how our budget operates to ensure we all approach spending with prudence and caution. Unlike some fixed funds, our church budget isn't 100% funded on day one. Instead, it accumulates gradually over the year through faithful tithes, offerings, and other contributions from our congregation. This means we'll start with a portion available (based on carryover and initial giving), and the rest will build month by month as the Lord

To honor this reality and practice good stewardship:

Be Judicious in Spending: Please review your department's needs carefully and prioritize essentials. For any non-routine expenses over \$1,000, let's discuss in advance to confirm alignment with available funds. (Just because it is in the "budget" does not mean it is funded). Monitor Progress Together: I'll continue to provide monthly updates on our financial position so we can adjust as needed and celebrate God's

Trust in God's Timing: As Proverbs 22:3 reminds us, "The prudent sees danger and hides himself, but the simple go on and suffer for it." By being cautious now, we position ourselves for abundance later in the

If you have guestions or ideas on how we can better manage resources, Lam always available.

Trent's Two Cents:


Sunday begins the Week of Prayer for State Missions. There will be an insert in Sunday's bulletin with a daily prayer guide to assist you as you pray. We will also be collecting the Janie Chapman Offering for State Missions throughout the month of September. This offering helps South Carolina Baptists reach the lost, plant churches, send missionaries, and serve communities in crisis. Our church goal this year is \$10,000.

Janie Chapman (1867-1948) was a prominent mission leader in our state. She served her church and community in many ways because she had a passion for reaching lost souls. She became the first President of the South Carolina Woman's Missionary Union in 1902 and served for 22 years. She was a great leader and motivator. In 1919, before the formation of the Cooperative Program, she encouraged the SC WMU to try to raise over one million dollars, and they exceeded their goal by giving \$1,487,647.00! In 1937 the state missions offering was named in her honor because of her service. Janie Chapman's personal motto was 1 Corinthians 15:58: "Therefore, beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." May we all serve the Lord with the same focus and enthusiasm as Janie Chapman. We can begin by praying for mission efforts in our state and giving generously to this mission offering.

Babylon & Beyond: The Sovereignty of God in the Book of Daniel (4:1-9) One of the greatest themes running through the Book of Daniel is how God used the exile of Israel to take the Gospel to the nations, and one of the greatest ways this is seen is in the personal testimony of Nebuchadnezzar. Chapter after chapter, we see his encounters with God through Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, but in today's chapter we see him have a direct encounter with God through his dream. Be sure to note, here, that it was not uncommon for prophets to have these kind of encounters with God, but it was exceedingly rare for anyone else to. What's also interesting is that this is recorded in the style of a royal proclamation from the viewpoint of the king, and while Nebuchadnezzar is perplexed by this revelation, he recognizes one thing for sure - that in Daniel rests "the spirit of the holy gods."

Even though Nebuchadnezzar is still wrestling at this point between the gods he has known and the God that Daniel is introducing him to, you can tell that he sees something in Daniel that is not present with his own magicians and wise men - the Holy Spirit had made His mark in Daniel's life and heart. It was unmistakable and unmissable. That made me ask a question - do others see that mark in my life? I think we could all take a moment and consider that. Nebuchadnezzar could see that "no mystery is too difficult for you" because of the God Daniel served, and he knew that Daniel could give him an answer. Do people see us and see God in us? Do they come to us because they know we serve a God that makes all things possible? I pray that we all will walk so close to God that others will see Him in us.

Moore News:

The first personal spiritual discipline that we will cover is Bible intake. I think we will all agree that reading our Bible is important. In fact, I would argue it is the most important discipline a Christian is to partake in. Within the category of Bible intake, there is meditation, and that is what our focus will be on this week.

Joshua 1:8, which states, "This Book of the Law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in it. For then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have good success" (ESV).

The Why: Many Christians who read the Bible struggle to retain all that they read. If one fails to retain what is read in the Bible, it becomes almost impossible to apply the truths of Scripture to one's life, resulting in being a hearer of the Word only (James 1:21-22). Donald Whitney states, "Reading is the exposure to Scripture, but meditation is the absorption of Scripture" (Whitney, Lecture). A careful reading of Joshua 1:8 brings out the connection between meditation and application (See bold words). Whitney further explains that when Christians meditate on a truth of Scripture, "We can smell its aroma more fully and taste it better" (Whitney, 74). This kind of experience with God and His word is what leads to application and ultimately, a life of godliness. The How: There is more than one correct way to meditate on Scripture. Biblical meditation, simply

put, is thinking about what you read in the Bible. No matter the method of meditation one uses, the goal of meditation should always be to apply what is read to one's life in order to grow in Christlikeness.
